Four years ago we lost our loved band member Gavin Westaway. Gavin's passion and hard work was amazing and we will never forget his contribution. The incredible talent of Joe Eldred (bass), Sally Baldwin (keyboard/vocals, Bruce Burgess (lead guitar), Geoff Sparkes (guitar/lead vocals), and Tony 'Lucky Prezzo' Thornton (drums/vocals) has the band cooking up a Rhythm and Blues storm, covering all your favourite rockin' songs from the 60's and beyond.



Ally Row



Triple J Unearthed winners. Port Fairy Folk Festival busking competition winners, Opened for ARIA award winner William Crighton, Played on both ABC Grass Roots and Henry Wagon's Double J as well as selected for high rotation on ABC Country.

Gunaikurnai/Gippsland based, Triple j unearthed winning Ally Row are a folk rock/alt country duo blending genres with their toe tapping music and heartfelt lyricism. The multi-instrumentalists incorporate electric banjo, guitar, keys, harmonica, stomp box and tambourine, creating an unexpectedly full and upbeat live experience. Their honest lyricism shines a light on the darker sides of love and mental health delivered with warm vocals, velvety harmonies and an infectious beat.

The duo take inspiration from Mumford and Sons, The 502s, Caamp, Morningsiders, Sons of the East and Of Monsters and Men, while maintaining their own unique and distinct sound.

Bubble Gumbo



Powered by horns and inspired by New Orleans grooves, Bubble Gumbo brings the house down with good time, dance music. Playing a mix of funky originals and rip snortin' covers, Bubble Gumbo is Sth Gippsland's hottest new brass band.

Lead by song writing genius Peter Doherty on vocals & bass, supported by local Gippsland musos (except Jim - he's got his own back story), Mark Sylvio (Tpt), Matt Dixon (Tromb), Justin Abicare (Sax/Flute), Roy John (Drums) & the Quincy Jones of Sth Gippsland Neil Gracey (Tpt & arranger), along with the famous Jim Glasson (Sax - formerly of the Vince Jones quintet), Bubble Gumbo is not to be missed. Their mandate? "Seriously, we gonna funk you up".

Midnight Possum

Formed in 2015, this four piece play classic pub rock and blues with Gavin Van Eade (guitar, vocals), Jules McMullan (guitar, vocals), Bruce Corr (bass) and Brendan 'Batman' Roberts (drums).

They have performed regularly all over South Gippsland including Korumburra, Tarwin Lower, Foster, Toora and Welshpool hotels and built a solid reputation with their mixture of original songs and covers of the Rolling Stones, Doors, The Beatles, Neil Young and many more.



Blind Cobbler's Thumb

Blind Cobbler's Thumb is a rollicking 4-piece Irish Band that is always in the mood for a 'knees-up-mother-brown'! Rebecca Bone (flute/whistle/vocals), Jules McMullan (mandolin/vocals), Fiona Curram (guitar, vocals) and Roy John (drums/vocals) do music from the Irish Isle with a twist of lemon, a shot of humour, and a pint or two of Paddy passion. This band will take you on a wild ride of singing and dancing, so don your brogues, grab a partner and take the rocky road to Dublin for a reely good time! Come lilt with the leprechauns, frolic with the four-leaf clovers and curtsy with the colleens as Blind Cobbler's Thumb do-si-do's you through punked up renditions of The Pogues, heartbreakingly tragic Irish ballads and fast traditional jigs.

FAQs on booking a band

How do I book a band? Most bands have a Facebook page - but email us if you can't track down their number. To begin, just give them a call (but not too early in the morning). Consider what you want the band for: to dance, to have as a background or to entertain? And remember, book early to save disappointment. Bands are often booked months in advance or annually for special occasions such as St. Patrick's Day, New Year's Eve, Christmas, etc.

It is easy to forget that musicians are not just putting in the gig time.

What's it going to cost me? Extensive hours of rehearsals, travel and set-up time all need to be factored in. A general policy is that each musician should receive no less than \$200 for a gig, but this is the bare minimum. Preparation for a 30-min gig is often just as much effort as a 2-hour gig, particularly when song requests are made. Our gigs often run for 3 hours or more. Load-up, travel, set-up and set-down can extend this beyond 6 hours and note that freelance musicians (which is mostly the case) have no sick pay, superannuation, etc. (not to mention the ongoing costs of equipment). A small bite to eat and some compensation for travel costs are always welcome! If the venue wishes for more music at the completion of the night, allow the musician to freely make this decision without pressure and always offer a little extra money for the time. Remember, your event is never the same without the musicians, and venues often reap a great deal of financial reward because of their presence.

Yes, musicians love their job, but they have to eat, too!

Here's a little checklist when booking them:

- Detailed knowledge of the performance space, including predicted size of audience and room or outdoor venue
 - Whether sound equipment/engineer needs to be provided
- Gig format eg. background music to start / dancing to finish / speeches included etc
- Length of sets / number of sets

What does a band need?

- Song requests for special occasions sent early to allow for proper preparation
- A safe performance space away from 'happy' punters trying to touch the expensive, often irreplaceable, or unaffordable equipment
- Sun or rain protection at outdoor gigs
- Prompt communication regarding any changes to the gig
- Musicians should be financially compensated for late cancellations
- Musicians have often turned down other well-paying jobs to be at your gig

What if I just want one musician?

Solo musicians are perfect for many gigs. Think carefully about what you want from the musician, give them lots of information to help the smooth running of your event, provide a safe space, pay them accordingly and love their work.

Music is a valuable, but sometimes undervalued asset to our community. It can help us dance, sing, cry, reflect, gather together, memorialise, channel anger, inspire thought, educate. The musicians are a vehicle for this love. We can't wait to share our music with you and your loved ones.
